Being a service organization, our creed encourages us to conduct youth activities, such as History Day, essay, oration, and poster contests; and recognition of public service, including law enforcement, EMS, Fire Safety, and teaching. These are all enjoyable and you take pride that you have done something worthwhile by recognizing public service or by enriching the learning experience of the community's youth. I hope to see you at our Sept 10 meeting at Falcon's Landing Retirement home in Sterling.



CHAPTER ATTENDS MEMORIAL DEDICATION IN CULPEPER


On June 20, the Culpeper Minutemen Chapter presided at the dedication of a memorial for Gabriel Long (b. 1751), who served in Captain John Jameson's Company, Culpeper Minutemen Battalion in Culpeper in the fall of 1775. Long fought victoriously at Great Bridge in December, 1775 to rid Virginia of British control. Commissioned Captain in Colonel Daniel Morgan's 11th Virginia Regiment, he served in all major engagements under General George Washington to include the defeat of General John Burgoyne in the Saratoga Campaign, and the Siege of Yorktown.

President Vern Eubanks led the chapter delegation, and placed a wreath in honor of Gabriel Long and on behalf of Fairfax Resolves. The U.S. Army Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps participated in the event, and demonstrated a

series of Revolutionary-era maneuvers as part of the dedication. At the end of the ceremony, VASSAR President Reverdy Wright and Culpeper Minutemen Chapter President Bill Schwetke presented a Certificate of Appreciation to the members of the Old Guard. Approximately 75 local citizens, SAR members, and NSDAR members were in attendance.

GUEST CONTRIBUTOR: 1776

(Our guest contributor for this issue of our newsletter is Jamie Highfill, wife of Compatriot Brian Eubanks. Jamie has kindly contributed a review of the musical 1776.)

The 1972 musical comedy, 1776, is a light-hearted, slightly slapstick and sometimes bawdy, snapshot of the weeks leading up to the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Told from the point of view of John Adams, played by William Daniels (The Graduate, Two for the Road, and Oh, God!), and through a

series of letters and imaginary conversations to his wife, Abigail, we see a man with firm convictions, almost to the point of alienating his fellow senators, but also a man with a strong sense of moral courage.

Benjamin Franklin, played by Howard de Silva (The Man from U.N.C.L.E., The Great Gatsby, and The Lost Weekend), is his practical and witty self, and provides the perfect sidekick for Adams, and with Thomas Jefferson (played by Ken Howard of The White Shadow and Murder, She Wrote fame) as the one delegated to write the document, the three make a delightful triumvirate.



The disagreement between Adams and Jefferson during revision of the Declaration about the use of the word “inalienable” made this English teacher chuckle, and Benjamin Franklin’s witticisms keep the mood of the story from falling into a historical drudge.

John Cullum (Northern Exposure), as Senator Edward Rutledge from South Carolina provides the perfect foil to the progress of the three, by refusing to sign unless references to slave-ownership are deleted, and he sings a powerful argument as his defense of the Southern way of life.

A Fourth of July tradition with my husband’s family, this film was a lovely reminder of what the holiday means to the history of our country and our culture.
